The Center for AIDS Research (CFAR) at Emory University is now accepting Fellowship applications for the Emory CFAR's 4th annual Planning for Success (PfS) NIH R-level Grant Writing Fellowship.

This 9-month Fellowship will be held via Zoom from November 9, 2021 to August 9, 2022 and is open to all faculty who are:

- from any school affiliated with an NIH-funded CFAR
- and eligible to apply to NIH for R-level funding
- and have not yet successfully competed for R01-level funding.

Applications from HBCU and HSI faculty are particularly encouraged.

The Fellowship is designed to help investigators successfully compete for an HIV-related research award that is either internal (their home CFAR Developmental Core) or external (an NIH R01, R03, R21, R34, etc.) in clinical, social/behavioral, virological, or immunological research.

Key Information:

- Each session will cover best practices for writing a section of an NIH-style proposal that aligns with the Office of AIDS Research's priorities for HIV research funding. (see NOT-OD-20-018)
- All Fellows will workshop sections of their assigned proposal draft during every PfS session, with a goal of completing a proposal for submission to NIH or their home CFAR by the end of the fellowship.

PfS meets online on the second Tuesday of each month from 2:00 - 4:00 ET. Fellows must commit to attending every session.

What are the requirements for *PfS* participation?

- *PfS* Fellows should be able to, on their own or with help from the Developmental Core of their home CFAR, identify a Grantsmanship Mentor who has a history of NIH funding as PI.
- PfS Fellows need to commit to full participation in course activities, as described below.

What is the standard PfS session format?

During the month between meetings, Fellows:

- Watch one or more videos covering the upcoming meeting topic;
- Develop an initial or second draft of an assigned application section and submit it for comments to their PfS small group "Zoommates" and Grantsmanship Mentor;
- Provide written comments on the section drafts submitted by their Zoommates.

During course sessions (second Tuesday of each month; 2-4pm ET), Fellows:

- Participate in a plenary discussion of that month's course material;
- Workshop their assigned application draft section in small group Zoom rooms.
